Is Dedicated to: Linda Hall, Librarian

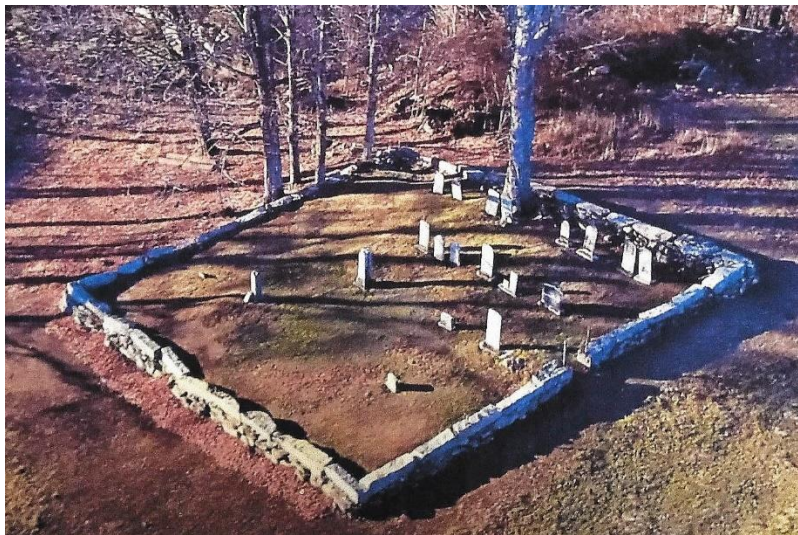

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW.....

CEMETERIES – Cemetery lots are \$150 each or a full plot of four lots is \$600. There are no restrictions in lot purchases. Lots are to be sold in single lot increments. All decorations need to be removed by October 1.

DOG REGISTRATIONS - are due by Jan 31st. See page 20 for further information.

END-OF-YEAR PROCESSING & ARCHIVING - TO CLOSE BOOKS - the Sangerville Town Office will be closed on Friday, Dec. 29, 2017 - to process all the end-of-year reports.

LOCAL LANDFILL & RECYCLING FACILITY - is for Sangerville residents to use and is located in Dover-Foxcroft. You will need a landfill sticker which you can pick up at the Sangerville Town Office - which is free to Sangerville residents and landowners. You can call the Dover-Foxcroft facility at 564-7940 for its hours of operation.

NEW THIS YEAR IN THE TOWN OFFICE - The Town office is now accepting payments by credit card. Payport is a service offered by a third party working in partnership with the State of Maine and the Town on your behalf. This is part of the Information Resource of Maine (InforME) program and some of the fees help to fund this and other Maine.gov online services. The Town Office is also now using the Maine Online Sportsman’s Electronic System (MOSES) to process all IF&W licenses and registrations. If you have any questions, call Dorene or Alvina at 876-2814.

TAX BILLS FOR 2017 - are usually mailed out by the end of June. If you have moved or have had a change of address, you need to notify us by May 1st so that we can update our tax records accordingly. Email Dorene dtsangerville@myfairpoint.net or Alvina tcsangerville@myfairpoint.net

WINTER PARKING BAN - all vehicles parked on the street during the winter plowing season may be towed away at the owners’ expense if the vehicle hinders snow removal and sanding efforts. Please be considerate and keep your vehicle off the street during plowing and sanding operations. Winter parking is banned on the south side of Church Street, all of Hunnewell Avenue, Maple Street, Mill Street, Pleasant Avenue from Maple Street to Main Street, the first 150 feet of McPhetres Road, the first 150 feet of Douty Hill Road, the first 150’ of Haley Court, on Main Street from School Street intersection to Mill Street, and in the “No Parking Fire Zone” of School Street, from Main Street intersection to the Abbie Fowler parking lot. No overnight parking is allowed in the Town Hall Parking Lot anytime during the year.

WINTER SAND PILE - the sand mixed with salt, covered with plastic tarps, costs the town a lot of money. Sangerville residents may get a couple of buckets/pails of sand for their driveways and walkways. The town does not allow pickup trucks to fill up and sand their long driveways or camp roads, as there are contractors in town who can be hired to do this!

911 (E-911) Service – The Town assigns a number to each residential address in Sangerville. This number enables the emergency responders to easily locate the physical address. This number should be displayed prominently where it is most visible from the road. It is recommended that reflective numbers be used that are at least four (4) inches high and can be read from the road. It is important that each resident comply with this request to assure that the effectiveness of the 911 service.

Dear Citizens of Sangerville:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty; I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.

Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

Dear Friends of Sangerville:

Since being sworn into the Senate in 2013, I have made it my mission to address at the federal level the most important issues facing our great state. Working closely with my colleagues in the Maine Congressional Delegation, we've been able to successfully secure a number of legislative victories that support our state's economy, our rich traditions, and the hardworking people I am proud to represent. In an increasingly polarized Congress, my goal as an Independent is to put partisanship aside, build consensus and further common-sense solutions to address the needs of the American people. To this end, I have co-founded the Former Governors Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.


One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students faced a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government. Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 brought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement – including the Drug Enforcement Agency – to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their diversion. Together, Senator Collins and I helped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada. While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's forest industry in the wake of several mill closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingenuity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignite Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services and Intelligence Committees, I work to keep Maine and our nation safe. Part of that important work means continuing to work for funding for the construction of Navy ships that will be used to protect American interests across the globe. We all know that "Bath Built is Best Built," which is why I've fought to authorize funding for Navy ships built at BIW. The best way to preserve peace is by deterring war through unassailable strength, and to do that we must support our shipbuilders and our brave service members and invest in our military. I strive to meet this solemn responsibly every day as a member of these committees, which is why I hardly ever miss a hearing and take great care in overseeing the agencies sworn to keep us safe. Armed Services Chairman John McCain called me "one of the most serious and hard-working members" of the Committee, and that's a humbling compliment from a true American hero.

DOG LICENSING

STATE OF MAINE REQUIREMENTS

The State of Maine requires dogs to be licensed at 6 months of age or within 10 days of ownership.

You must show evidence of current rabies vaccination at the time of registration (yearly) and a spay/neuter certificate, if applicable.

Fees are \$6 for spayed/neutered dogs and \$11 for unsprayed/unneutered dogs.

Renewal period for dog licensing begins in Mid-October of each year, when the new tags are received from Animal Welfare, and must be completed no later than December 31st of each year. A late fee of \$25 (in addition to the license fee) will be applied after January 31st.

Owners of unlicensed dogs will be served a summons to appear at the 13th District Court in Dover-Foxcroft for collection of fees. Owners will be responsible for all court fees and fines. This is a Maine State Animal Welfare Law.

Fees for dog licenses are as follows:

Neuter/Spay: \$ 6.00 each dog
Non-Neuter/Spay: \$11.00 each dog
*Kennel License: \$42.00 (up to 10-dogs per each kennel).
Late Fee: \$25.00 each dog (effective Feb. 1st.)
Kennel late fee: \$25.00 each kennel (effective Feb. 1st.)
* = subject to yearly kennel inspection (per state law)

As a reminder, it is against the law in the State of Maine to transport a dog in an open vehicle on a public way unless the dog is protected in a manner that prevents the dog from falling or jumping or being thrown from the vehicle. However, exceptions apply to dogs engaged in certain types of agricultural activities or dogs covered under special hunting permits.

Please take a moment to update your addresses on your dog registrations.

If you believe an animal is suffering from extreme temperatures, lack of food and/or water, or may be lost and needs help, PLEASE report it to 876-2814 or email Dorene Foss at dtcsangerville@myfairpoint.net. All reports are kept strictly confidential.

2016

Dear Residents,

In 2016, paving was done on three of the towns major roads. Approx. 2400 feet of the Frenchs Mills Road was reclaimed and paved starting from Frenchs Mill Cemetery towards Alder Brook. The end of Silvers Mills Road from the Dexter town line to Hartford Lane (3250 feet) received a shim & pave. Two sections on the East Sangerville Road totaling 1000 feet was reclaimed and paved. One section was just before the Flanders Hill Road and the other was near the McNaughton Hill Road. Fabric and gravel was laid on a section of the Gray Road where there was a mud problem during spring thaw.

Roads planning to be paved in 2017 consist of the last section to be paved on the Frenchs Mill Road (2400 feet). The Silvers Mills Road (2800 + feet), starting at Hartford Lane heading north to the Frenchs Mill Road and possibly further depending on cost.

Report from the Assessor's desk

Hello Friends and Neighbors,

Taxes, who can say they like them or are looking forward to that tax bill in the mail? Not me, that's for sure, however they are one of the things we cannot avoid being a home owner. I have had the pleasure of working with the Selectmen in a lot of Towns and they really put a lot of effort into trying to keep your tax bill down. Between school, county and your municipal budget it can be a hair pulling experience. I hear questions all the time about the appraisal value, the tax value of your home and why the difference. Why does it matter in the end I still have to pay taxes? We would like to have the assessment right on your home so come in and talk with us make an appointment if there is problems with your home that the assessor does not know about it will make a difference in valuing your home. As the assessor, we must put a value on both land and structures throughout your whole community and this process is done by sales in your community.

I would like to talk about the Homestead Exemption again this year. Last year the exemption changed from a \$10,000 to \$15,000 reduction of taxable value of your property. This year the exemption has gone up to a \$20,000 reduction in taxable value. This exemption is mandated by the State of Maine and does help the residents that qualify for this exemption, but as we know the more the exemption the more the mill rate will go up to towns expenses. If you qualify for this exemption it needs to be filed before April first it takes minutes to fill out and easy process to get qualified. First you will have to claim residency in town, live there for a year and you can only claim the homestead exemption in one town. If you think you qualify please let us know we can help you if need for this exemption.

If you are 62 years or older and served in a federally recognized war period you may qualify for the Veterans Exemption. If you have a VA paper that shows you qualify and are under 62 you may also qualify for this exemption. Bring in your DD2 14 or your tax exemption code paperwork from your VA office. We would be glad to sit down with you and help fill out these exemption forms. The Veterans Exemption if qualified, reduces your taxable value by \$6,000.

To the Taxpayers & Pet Owners of Sangerville;

I am Gary Sudsbury, Sr. from Dover-Foxcroft, because of my concern (but mostly my love for animals!) I once again will assume the responsibility as the Animal Control Officer for Sangerville. Please feel free to contact me at 564-2931 or 343-4389.

If you have, a complaint or questions and I will do my best to answer them, or try to find the answer for you.

Please remember that as owners or the keepers of cats & dogs. They must be vaccinated against rabies under 7- 3916. You will need to show proof of up-to-date rabies shots in order for your town to issue you a license for your dog(s). Dogs over 6 months of age must be licensed by January 1 under 7- 3921. Please keep in mind that there is a late fee after January 31.

In addition, any dog(s) that reaches the age of 6 months between January 1. and October 15, of any year must be vaccinated against rabies and be licensed within 10 business days. 7-3916.

If you no longer own a dog, or sadly, they have died, please notify your Town Office so they can update their records.

Please believe me as an animal lover! I understand that when any one finds a cat or dog or any animals that is sick or hurt. Our first thought is to get it to a veterinarian for help; but in doing so, you should understand that **you could, be held responsible for all expenses for the treatment and boarding of the injured animal!**

As an Animal Control Officer, it is my responsibility, under 7-3948 paragraph 2, to take an injured stray animal to its owner, if known, so the owner may seek the medical attention their pet may need. **if the owner is unknown, under Maine law, I shall seek medical attention for the injured companion animal.**

Please always be aware of the Danger of Rabies when approaching any Domesticated or Udomesticated animals that may be acting strangely .

Please always remember that a stray dogs or cats are someone's pet and should be treated in a respectful way.

2016 Sangerville Community Forestry Committee Report

Due in large part to shrinking pulpwood markets, no official business or harvesting operations regarding the Town's forestlands took place during the year, and so the SCF committee did not meet and took no action during 2016.

Silvicultural recommendations from the 2003 forestry management plans and the 2008 addendum suggest a range of conditions for accomplishment, one of which is to cut when the markets are favorable. The successful harvesting and replanting over the past 10 years has improved the general quality of the remaining standing trees, and reduced the urgency to cut for salvage purposes. Hopefully markets will improve over the course of the next few years.

Invasive plant control and management of the planted saplings on the Bean Hill lot will need attention in 2017. The Committee plans to sponsor volunteer work days to offer residents opportunity to help further improve the Town's valuable forest assets.

The Rec department had over 100 kids participate in each of our programs this year.

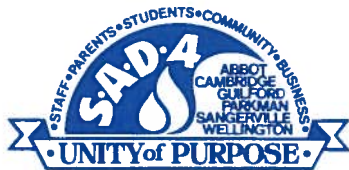
Work continues on the old Well's property. Our goal for the coming year is to have the new multi-purpose field and new gazebo completed by the fall of 2017.

Dear Citizens of SAD #4,

It is once again the start of budget developing time for school districts across the state of Maine. The Piscataquis area has had some recent press regarding the economic woes of the communities. The reality of the situation is, regardless of population leaving and people on fixed incomes, there are still children that need an education to help them become productive members for the community. These realities remain the same regardless of who is in the position of Superintendent.

Budgets are developed with the information that the Board and administrators have at the time, both for the present and the future. If every year since 1999 had been “flat” funded to the towns as has been suggested to the Board, there would not even be a hint of SAD #4 in existence today, because it would not have taken into consideration the increase in the economics. Also, as with the town, it would have depleted the small cushion to working the district in the red. Instead, the district leaders for the past 20 years have not succumbed to the voices in the crowd questioning their financial know-how, but built budgets that have been good for education (children) and keep a school in the greater community.

We will again be building a budget, balancing an adequate education for the children and being fiscally responsible. The question in the minds of the Board and administrators in developing a 2017-2018 budget is, “Does the public want to keep a PreK-12 school in their community?” The cost to educate children in SAD #4 is similar to the cost in other area schools. If we send the students to other districts which would, in turn, close our schools, would that save money? Will it provide for more opportunities for the students?

Two reasons families move to towns are employment and schools. There are not many new job opportunities to attract people to our district. We continue to have good schools and that should be enough reason to have people move into the six towns that comprise SAD #4.

Currently, the SAD #4 Board is looking at ways to be more efficient and we are working with another neighboring district to explore short-term and long-term solutions. This is an invitation to the citizens to visit our schools while they are in session. Please come listen to the discussions at the School Board meetings and Committee meetings. Call my office. I will answer your questions or find the answer for you. It is so important to get the information from the people in the positions: teachers, principals, or superintendent and get it for yourself first hand.

It is my hope that in developing the budget for 2017-18, that the people take an active roll to find out information and that people care enough to take positive steps to help with the budget instead of criticizing and gossiping. Please come to the office or call to share your ideas.

September 30 ended another year of progress here at **Mayo Regional Hospital**. We have made changes in many areas to improve the care our patient's receive. If I could describe our year with only two words, they would be **Safety and Access**.

Patient Safety is always a priority, especially in healthcare. But this year we have been particularly proud of the strides we have made in embedding a safety culture in our organization. Patient Safety is the first item discussed at every meeting, at every level of the organization, including the Board and Medical Staff.

We have instituted Patient Safety Huddles, every Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings. These huddles are a place for Department Leaders and Supervisors to report potential safety concerns to the CEO or Patient Safety Officer in real time so that action plans can be put in place and resources properly allocated.

We survey the safety culture each year and have seen slow and steady improvements over the past two years. This means employees feel they have the support of management to bring safety concerns to our attention and we will follow through to correct them.

We have also invested in resources for staff and patient safety. One major change this year is the addition of a Security Guard position at night. We contract with Securitas for this service and it is to assist the staff with building security as well as with aggressive or potentially violent patients. This has been well received.

One of the biggest investments we are making to improve patient safety is our construction project. The project will re-locate the SCU rooms to the Medical Surgical Unit, therefore giving those nurse's more peer resources. It will also re-locate the Oncology infusion unit to the second floor of the hospital, giving those patients immediate access to back-up nursing care, an MD and the pharmacist. The projects will be complete by May and will represent a \$2.2 million investment.

Access to care is another major focus of our Board and Leadership team. We have made some great strides this year.

All of our primary care sites have added open access (same day) visits. So if you wake up in the morning and don't feel well, you should be able to get an appointment that day, and avoid going to the ER.

Our psychiatry and counseling center has added more nurses and nurse practitioners. This is in a conscious effort to allow them to see more patients and greatly reduce the wait times for psychiatric care.

Our Business office has created a new Financial Assistance Policy. This is well advertised throughout the hospital and is designed to efficiently help those who need assistance in paying for the healthcare. Last year Mayo assisted the region by approximate \$3million in free services.

Mayo Regional Hospital continues to recruit providers that best meet specific community needs. The following new providers will join our team in 2017 to further enhance access to healthcare in our region.



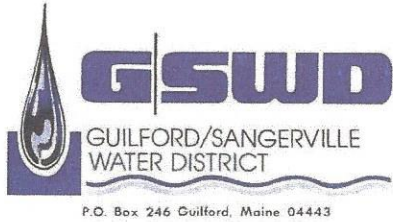

The Sangerville Public Library has had a busy year. The library was awarded one grant in 2016. A \$500 grant from the Rose and Samuel Rudman Foundation Library Trust Fund through the Maine Community Foundation enabled us to buy many new children's books for the summer reading program, "Ready, Set, Read". Seven children, ages 5-8, participated in the summer reading program. Together they read a total of 540 books over the seven weeks. A drawing for prizes was held on the final day of the program. All participants received 4 books and a certificate of achievement.

The following services are provided for you by your library: 3 patron computers, wireless internet access including Ancestry.com free to patrons, interlibrary loan services, photocopying, a variety of DVD's for children and adults, new books, a place to read and relax, and for children a safe place to visit while looking for just the right book to read or game to play.

We are a public library with a private board of trustees. The Library Board of Trustees meets the third Thursday of each month Sept.-June. This is where decisions concerning the operation of the library are made. Please let us know if you'd like to serve on the Library Board of Trustees. Stop by the library and get an application.

In 2016 there were 3186 patron visits with a circulation of books totaling 1871. With 3 patron computers and internet access available 935 people logged 959 hours of internet usage. There was a DVD circulation of 1849. We had 45 new patrons join the library in 2016. Are you one of them? Remember, Sangerville residents can become patrons of the library **FREE** of charge. This is the best deal in town.

COMMUNITY ROOM RENTAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Adopted August 29, 1997

Amended March 2, 2001

The Sangerville Town Hall Community Room, like the rest of the building, is a public building meant for everyone's enjoyment and use. The room is situated on the first floor, is handicapped-accessible, and has access to handicapped-accessible bathrooms. The room will hold roughly 40 seated individuals; there are folding wooden and metal chairs to accommodate between 30-40 individuals comfortably. There are also four folding tables, and one large easel. Several windows, a hallway and outside entrance, and carpeting make the room a pleasant place to meet and hold assemblies.

All service groups providing a service to the Sangerville Community are invited to use this space free of charge, provided there is not a conflict with a regularly-scheduled municipal meeting or pre-scheduled meeting of any group. The room is expected to be left as it is found.

For non-service groups, or groups which do not provide a service to the Sangerville Community, the following procedures must be followed to rent the Community Room:

- The room must be scheduled ahead of time with one of the clerks or the Town Manager, to ensure availability, it is recommended to schedule at least two weeks in advance.
- \$25.00 fee must be paid to the Town of Sangerville prior to use of the room per day or night.
- If necessary, a key will be issued to the contact person for the group or organization renting the room; it is this individual's responsibility to return the key to the Town Office within 24-hours of the meeting date, or make arrangements for later drop-off within this period. If key(s) issued to individuals are not returned, they will be charged for re-keying the locks.
- The room will be inspected by the Town Manager following its use. If the room must be cleaned or if anything is damaged as a result of the use of this room, an additional \$25.00 will be assessed to the contact person, plus the cost of repair of whatever article(s) was/were broken.
- A signed agreement must be completed in the Town Office at least 24-hours before the room is to be used; all of the above requirements must be met before the room may be used or a key issued.
- The Town Manager will determine if a group is indeed providing a service to the Sangerville Community, therefore whether the group must pay for the use of the room. The Board of Selectmen will serve as the appellate body for this determination.

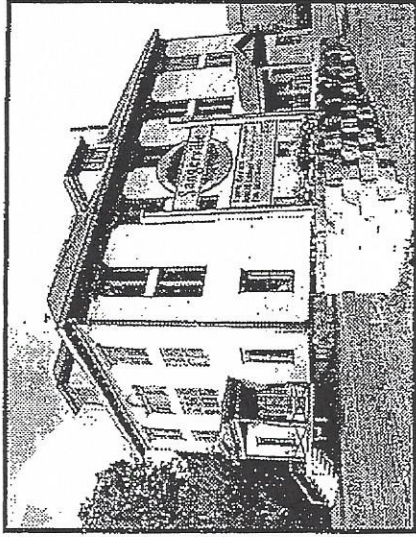

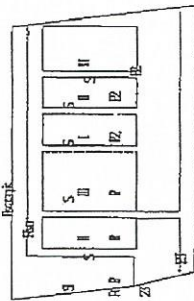
Sangerville Municipal Building

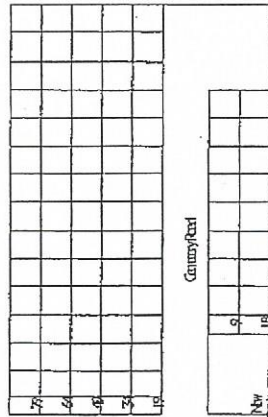

VILLAGE CEMETERY



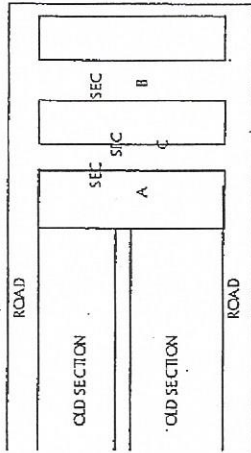
From the Town Hall parking lot, turn left onto Rt. 23. Proceed north for 0.2 miles. The Cemetery is on the right.

TOWNHOUSE CEMETERY



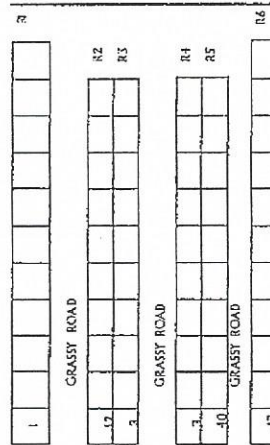

KNOWLTON MILLS CEMETERY



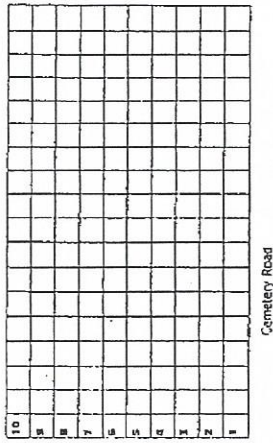

FRENCH'S MILLS CEMETERY



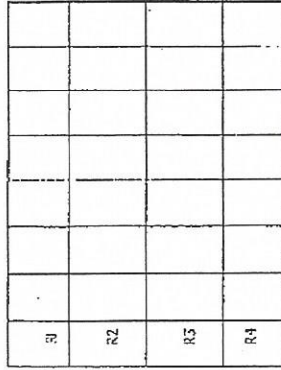

ARTICLE 4: To elect:
One Selectman, Assessor & Overseer of the Poor, for a three-year term and to fix compensation.

To set the Selectmen Stipend at \$800 per year.
Three School Committee Members for three-year terms
One Sanitary District Trustee for a three-year term
One Board of Trustee for HAD #4 (Mayo)

BUSINESS ARTICLES

- ARTICLE 5:** To see if the Town will fix a date when taxes on real estate and personal property shall be due before 5:00 p.m. August 31, 2017 and payable, and fix a rate of interest to be charged on taxes unpaid after said date. (The maximum allowed is 7% per Title 36, M.R.S.A. § 505.4)
- Select Board recommends 7%
- ARTICLE 6:** To see if the town will authorize prepayment of 2018 real estate and personal property taxes.
- ARTICLE 7:** To see if the Town will allow a discount of two percent (2%) on taxes paid in full before 5:00 p.m. on July 31, 2017 and vote to allow for payments received on taxes to be applied to the taxpayer's oldest outstanding tax bill.

ARTICLE 26: To see what sum of money the Town of Sangerville will vote to fund approved articles 14 through 25, the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee Recommend: Excise \$232,000 Revenue Sharing \$64,446, Local Road Assistance Program \$34,178, (2016 Taxed Education prior to the ratified referendum vote \$14,435.29 from dedicated revenue 2016) other Revenue \$52,764, and Surplus \$100,000, for a total of \$497,823; the remainder in the amount of \$558,464 to be raised through property taxes, together with the Town's County Tax Assessment and the Town's local share of education costs as determined in the School Budget Referendum.

Board of Selectmen Recommend a yes vote.

- ARTICLE 31:** Shall the Town vote to give the monies raised from the State Snowmobile Registration received in 2017 to the Four-Winds Snowmobile Club?

- ARTICLE 32:** Moderator to swear in the Town Clerk.

- ARTICLE 33:** Moderator to swear in the newly elected Selectman.

Dreaming of warmer weather and the sounds of summer, the Park Committee has been working diligently to formulate a plan to develop the Sangerville ball field into something more. With the addition of the Wells property, the Town now has the opportunity to go from a place where ball games are played, to a park that can be enjoyed both by the young and the young-at-heart.

With construction, already underway for an additional multi-purpose field, the Committee is now working to construct a large gazebo to begin the transformation of being "just a ball field" to instead, a destination for all to enjoy. While the plans are grand, the Committee also recognizes that the park must be developed in stages. Already, over \$5400 in financial support has been received with more pledged. And, along with this, the committee has received just as much in the form of donated labor/equipment and supplies.

Once the gazebo is in place, the committee wants to establish monthly summer concerts as a way to bring the community together. It is anticipated that corporate sponsors will be found for each of these concerts. Also, discussions have centered on perhaps renting out the space for family reunions, business outings or maybe even weddings as a way to generate revenue to support further development of the park.

The committee is also in the process of researching grants that may be available to continue the upgrades needed to support the community building process. The Maine Community Foundation has grant funds designated specifically for Piscataquis County that would support this mission. And, there are also other resources/grants that would be available as the park evolves into a destination spot.

The Park Committee has asked the select board to include a warrant at the Town Meeting to utilize the unspent funds in the Sangerville Days account towards the construction of the gazebo. Understand that these funds are already in place and would not be associated with any type of additional expense for the residents. Please join us before the meeting starts to view the plans for the park and understand what it could mean for the Town. As a community, united, we are able to accomplish much verses a community divided. This is an opportunity to bring all residents together and share in everything that is good about living in Sangerville.
